ARIZONA SECRETARY OF STATE ADRIAN FONTES' RÉSPONSE TO NOTICE OF SUPPLEMENTAL AUTHORITY IN SUPPORT OF PLAINTIFFS' MOTION FOR A NEW TRIAL

(Expedited Challenge Matter)

(Assigned to Hon. Lee F. Jantzen)

Defendant Adrian Fontes, in his official capacity as the Arizona Secretary of State (the "Secretary"), joins the Maricopa County Defendants' Response to Plaintiffs' Notice of Supplemental Authority in full. The Secretary responds to one other assertion in Plaintiffs' Notice.

Plaintiffs assert "[t]he Order further supports [their] argument that, based on the narrow recount vote deficit that Secretary Hobbs revealed after the initial trial and factintensive arguments provided in Plaintiffs' pending motion, Plaintiffs' 'competent mathematical basis to conclude that the outcome would plausibly have been different' provides a basis for a new trial and relief in this Court." Notice at 2:14–19.

This convoluted assertion is a non sequitur. The Order's reference to a "competent mathematical basis" quotes paragraph 11 of the court of appeals' decision. Order at 3–4. In paragraph 11, the court of appeals rejects Kari Lake's assertion that she did not need to prove official misconduct "did in fact affect the result" of the election. Lake v. Hobbs, No. 1 CA-CV 22-0779, 2023 WL 2052341, at *2, ¶ 11 (Ariz. Ct. App. Feb. 16, 2023), available at https://tinyurl.com/3wrk5rfj. The court of appeals, affirmed by the supreme court on this point, ruled that an election is not "uncertain unless votes are affected 'in sufficient number to alter the outcome of the election." Id. (citation omitted). And this can only be shown with "a competent mathematical basis to conclude that the outcome would plausibly have been different, not simply an untethered assertion of uncertainty." Id. (emphasis added) (citations omitted); Order at 3–4.

The Order's restatement of a legal standard does not mean Plaintiffs get a second trial to try and meet that standard. Nowhere does the Order state or imply that an election contestant may move for (let alone obtain) a second trial. Nowhere does the Order state or imply that an election contestant may seek more discovery (or obtain discovery previously requested that was properly denied) after a trial. Nowhere does the Order state or imply that an election contestant may effectively amend their statement of election contest to pursue new theories after losing a trial. And nowhere does the Order state or imply that the Secretary's compliance with the recount statutes and the Recount Order means Plaintiffs get another bite of the apple.

Plaintiffs omitted the supreme court's agreement with the court of appeals that "an untethered assertion of uncertainty[]" is not enough to overturn an election. Notice at 2:14–19. For the reasons explained in Defendants' Responses, this is all Plaintiffs have to work with. The Order does not help them.
