## INTRODUCTION

Plaintiff asks the Court to enjoin House Bill 892 (2023) (“HB 892”) with a dubious sense of urgency. Plaintiff employs a scattershot approach, asserting a collection of tenuous claims in its attempt to paint HB 892 as a dire threat to Montana voters based on hypothetical situations on the margins, all the while ignoring the glaring fact that HB 892 represents the status quo—it has been in effect for nearly six months and an entire election cycle without any actual evidence of the purported harms Plaintiff laments. The reality is that HB 892 is a proper exercise of legislative authority aimed at preventing fraud and preserving public confidence in fair elections. Because Plaintiff cannot establish otherwise—and it cannot satisfy the requisite elements for a preliminary injunction—the Court must deny Plaintiff’s Motion for Preliminary Injunction.

## BACKGROUND

The Governor signed HB 892 into law on May 22, 2023, following its passage by the Legislature with bipartisan support. HB 892 amends Mont. Code Ann. § 13-35-210 to rearticulate the prohibition of double voting with greater precision (§ 13-35-210(2), (4), (7)), to generally prohibit an elector from purposefully remaining registered to vote in more than one jurisdiction (§ 13-35-210(5)),<sup>1</sup> and to provide a criminal penalty for violations of its provisions (§ 13-35-210 (6)). (See HB 892, attached as **Exhibit A**.) HB 892 also contains a severability clause and an immediate effective date. (*Id.* at §§ 3, 4.) As relevant here, Plaintiff only challenges HB 892’s multiple registration prohibition, referred to by Plaintiff as the “deregistration requirement” and “omission requirement,” (Doc. 15 at 2–3) which states in full:

A person or elector may not purposefully remain registered to vote in more than one place in this state or another state any time, unless related to involvement in special district elections. A person or elector previously registered to vote in another county or another state shall provide the previous registration information on the Montana voter registration application provided for in 13-2-110.

(*Id.* at § 1(5).) This provision codifies Montana’s longstanding practice of requiring voter registration applicants (“registrants”) to provide previous voter registration information. (Decl. Regina Plettenberg, ¶ 6 (Dec. 5, 2023), attached as **Exhibit B**; Decl. Connor Fitzpatrick, ¶ 7 (Dec.

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<sup>1</sup> Montana is not alone in prohibiting voters from remaining registered in more than one jurisdiction. *See, e.g.*, LSA-R.S. 18:101 (“A citizen of this state shall not be or remain registered or vote in more than one place of residence at any one time.”); Ind. Code. § 3-14-2-4 (“A person who recklessly registers or offers to register to vote more than once commits a Class A misdemeanor.”); Wis. Stat. Ann. § 12.13 (“(c) Registers as an elector in more than one place for the same election....”).

7, 2023), attached as **Exhibit C**.) Indeed, Montana’s voter registration application forms (as provided for in Mont. Code Ann. § 13-2-110) have required registrants to provide prior voter registration information, if applicable, for decades. (See Montana Voter Registration from 1968, attached as **Exhibit D**; Montana Voter Registration from 1995, attached as **Exhibit E**; Montana Voter Registration from 1997, attached as **Exhibit F**.) The current form is consistent with the prior forms with respect to the information the State requires from a registrant. (See Montana Voter Registration Application, attached as **Exhibit G**.)

Despite Plaintiff’s contentions of ambiguity (Doc. 15 at 4), Montana’s Voter Registration Application is quite clear as to the information it requires if the registrant was previously registered in another county or state. (See *id*, Section 9) (“Previous City, County, and State,” “Residence Address of Previous Registration,” and “Previous Registration Name.”). Compliance with HB 892 only requires a registrant to fill out those three boxes in the same manner the State has required for decades. (Ex. B at ¶¶ 7, 9; Ex. C at ¶¶ 7, 13.) According to Montana’s former Elections Director, this information notifies the State of prior registration and enables the Secretary of State’s Office (“SOS”) to inform the former jurisdiction of the change in registration. (Decl. Dana Corson, ¶¶ 3–5 (Dec. 7, 2023), attached as **Exhibit H**.) Nothing more is required of the registrant to comply with HB 892. HB 892 simply codified this requirement and bolstered its enforceability by imposing a criminal penalty. Notably, requiring prior voter registration information appears to be the rule, rather than the exception, for states within the Ninth Circuit. (See California Voter Registration Quick Guide, Section 6, attached as **Exhibit I**; Arizona Voter Registration Form, Section 17, attached as **Exhibit J**; Nevada Voter Registration Application, Section 14, attached as **Exhibit K**; Washington State Voter Registration Form, Section 5, attached as **Exhibit L**; Alaska Voter Registration Application, Section 14, attached as **Exhibit M**; Hawaii Voter Registration Application, Section 7, attached as **Exhibit N**; and Idaho Voter Registration Form, Section 6, attached as **Exhibit O**.) Montana’s Voter Registration Application follows in similar form. (See Ex. G.)

The requirement for a registrant to provide their applicable address information is rooted in Montana’s law requiring registrants to establish residency. See Mont. Code Ann. § 13-1-112 (“For registration, voting, or seeking election to the legislature, the residence of an individual must be determined...”). The registrant must provide their address of residence to the election administrator. Mont. Code Ann. § 13-2-108. And regardless of the circumstances—whether it be

a person with multiple homes or a student relocating to Montana only to attend college—that person may only have one residence for purposes of voting as a matter of law. Mont. Code Ann. § 1-1-215(2). It therefore follows that the State must know where the registrant resides at that time and, if applicable, where they previously resided to ensure voter eligibility and prevent double voting. Furthermore, the imposition of criminal liability for a failure to provide prior voter registration information requires much more than a simple “omission.”<sup>2</sup> A registrant must “purposefully” exclude the information when registering to vote. (Ex. A at § 1(5).)

According to the former Elections Director, there have been numerous “past instances in Montana where voters have ostensibly voted in the same election twice.” (Ex. H at ¶ 7.) In fact, the SOS obtained a list of individual voters who appear to have cast ballots in two different states for the same election during the 2020 general election. (*Id.* at ¶ 8; MT Voters Who Voted in Two Different States in the 2020 General Election, attached as **Exhibit P.**) The SOS confirmed the accuracy of the list and provided it to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. (*Id.* at ¶¶ 10–11.) Even one instance of double voting is significant, as close counts in elections do occur— “it is not uncommon to see a race in an election decided by one vote, or even result in a tie.” (*Id.* at ¶ 13.) Indeed, this was the result of the recent City Council election in Missoula, Montana.<sup>3</sup> Ultimately, it is clear that the occurrence, significance, and impact of double voting are not merely imagined as Plaintiff seems to suggest. (Doc. 15 at 18.)

### **APPLICABLE STANDARDS**

In 2023, the Montana Legislature amended Mont. Code Ann. § 27-19-201, the statute governing the circumstances under which courts can grant injunctive relief. The Legislature intentionally mirrored the federal standard, which allows for a preliminary injunction to be granted only when the applicant establishes that: a) the applicant is likely to succeed on the merits; b) the applicant is likely to suffer irreparable harm in the absence of preliminary relief; c) the balance of equities tips in the applicant’s favor; and d) an injunction is in the public interest. This test is conjunctive, meaning the applicant must satisfy not just one element, but *all* elements, of the test. *Winter v. Natl. Res. Def. Council, Inc.*, 555 U.S. 7 (2008) (applying identical test) (citations

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<sup>2</sup> Plaintiff repeatedly refers to a failure to provide previous registration information as an “omission” in an apparent attempt to distract from the applicable *mens rea* (“purposefully”) and to mischaracterize HB 892 as legislation that criminalizes simple mistakes. omitted). Plaintiff “bears the burden of demonstrating the need for an injunction order.” § 27-19-201(4). A preliminary injunction is an extraordinary remedy that may only be awarded upon a clear showing that the movant is entitled to such relief; it is never awarded as of right. *Winter*, 555 U.S. at 22 (citation omitted). Lastly, if Plaintiff establishes that a preliminary injunction should issue, the injunctive relief “should be no more burdensome to the defendant than necessary to provide complete relief to the plaintiffs.” *Califano v. Yamasaki*, 442 U.S. 682, 702 (1979).

## ARGUMENT

Here, the Court should deny Plaintiff’s Motion because it fails to satisfy any, much less *all*, of the four elements necessary to obtain a preliminary injunction.<sup>4</sup> Plaintiff cannot show a likelihood of success on the merits, a likelihood of suffering irreparable harm, that the balance of the equities tips in its favor, or that a preliminary injunction is in the public interest. Because the test is conjunctive, any one of these deficiencies is sufficient to defeat Plaintiff’s Motion.

### **I. PLAINTIFF IS NOT LIKELY TO SUCCEED ON THE MERITS.**

Montana courts presume that enacted laws are constitutional. *See Powder River Cnty. v. State*, 2002 MT 259, ¶ 73, 312 Mont. 198, 60 P.3d 357. This is not a toothless presumption: “[t]he constitutionality of a legislative enactment is prima facie presumed,” and “[e]very possible presumption must be indulged in favor of the constitutionality of a legislative act.” *Id.* at ¶¶ 73–74. The question for a reviewing court is not whether it is possible to condemn, but whether it is possible to uphold the statute. *Saterlee v. Lumberman’s Mut. Cas. Co.*, 2009 MT 368, ¶ 10, 353 Mont. 265, 222 P.3d 566. Plaintiff bears the burden to prove unconstitutionality beyond a reasonable doubt, and if any doubt exists, it must be resolved in favor of the constitutionality of HB 892. *Id.* (citation omitted). Moreover, to succeed in its facial challenge, Plaintiff must prove beyond a reasonable doubt that “no set of circumstances exist under which [HB 892] would be valid.” *Id.*

**A. PLAINTIFF LACKS STANDING TO CHALLENGE HB 892.**

Montana courts may decide only justiciable cases—that is, “cases or controversies (case-or-controversy standing) within judicially created prudential limitations (prudential standing).” *Bullock v. Fox*, 2019 MT 50, ¶ 28, 395 Mont. 35, 435 P.3d 1187. Justiciability is a threshold jurisdictional issue—“without it [courts] cannot adjudicate a dispute.” *Broad Reach Power, LLC v. Mont. Dept. of Pub. Serv. Regul., Pub. Serv. Commn.*, 2022 MT 227, ¶ 10, 410 Mont. 450, 520 P.3d 301; *see also Bullock*, ¶ 28 (standing is a threshold jurisdictional requirement); *cf. Larson v. State*, 2019 MT 28, ¶ 18, 394 Mont. 167, 434 P.3d 241 (justiciability is a *mandatory prerequisite* to initial and continued exercise of subject matter jurisdiction”). It limits Montana courts to deciding only actual, redressable controversies. *Bullock*, ¶ 28. To establish standing, a plaintiff must demonstrate a past, present, or threatened injury to a property or civil right that would be alleviated by successfully maintaining the action.” *Mont. Immigrant Justice All. v. Bullock*, 2016 MT 104, ¶ 19, 383 Mont. 318, 371 P.3d 430. “The alleged injury must be concrete, meaning actual or imminent, and not abstract, conjectural, or hypothetical; redressable; and distinguishable from injury to the public generally.” *Bullock*, ¶ 31 (citations omitted).

At the federal level, the United States Supreme Court has consistently held that “the ‘chilling effect’ associated with a potentially unconstitutional law being ‘on the books’ is insufficient to ‘justify federal intervention’ in a pre-enforcement suit.” *Woman’s Health v. Jackson*, 142 S. Ct. 522, 538 (2021) (quotation marks and citation omitted). Instead, the Supreme Court “has always required proof of a more concrete injury and compliance with traditional rules of equitable practice.” *Id.* (citations omitted). “The Court has consistently applied these requirements whether the challenged law in question is said to chill the free exercise of religion, the freedom of speech, the right to bear arms, or any other right.” *Id.*

In this case, Plaintiff relies heavily on an alleged “chilling effect,” rather than evidence of any actual or threatened injury. *Mont. Immigrant Justice*, ¶ 19; *Olson v. Dept. of Revenue*, 223 Mont. 464, 470, 726 P.2d 1162, 1166 (1986) (constitutional aspect of standing requires a plaintiff to show that he has personally been injured by the alleged violation). Plaintiff fails to show how HB 892’s multiple registration prohibition has actually impacted its ability to conduct voter outreach in the six months HB 892 has been in effect. Nor does Plaintiff provide evidence of any chilled speech or concrete injury resulting from Montana’s decades-long requirement that registrants provide previous registration information, whether before or after HB 892. (*Contra Ex.*

B at ¶ 8, Ex. C at ¶ 12; Exs. D–F.) Indeed, despite the SOS having processed 17,982 voter registrations (with an increase of over 650 in the past week) since HB 892 went into effect (Ex. H at ¶ 15), Plaintiff cites no more than concerns based on strained hypotheticals. Moreover, at least 54 elections have occurred in Montana during that same time, yet the SOS “has not received a single complaint from a voter related to HB 892.” (*Id.* at ¶¶ 16–17.) This significantly undercuts Plaintiff’s claim that HB 892 has somehow prevented or otherwise affected their ability to “encourag[e] members and eligible Montanans to register to vote.” (Doc. 15 at 6.)

Plaintiff’s claims also rely on a purported risk of criminal prosecution. (*Id.* at 7 (“HB 892 chills LWVMT’s expressive activities because LWVMT fears the threat of criminal liability under HB 892 to itself, its members and volunteers, and the voters it assists.”).) Plaintiff argues that the “inclusion of ‘purposefully’ [in the Deregistration requirement] does little to clarify” and “[t]he Omission provision, for its part, has no scienter element at all. . . .” (*Id.* at 16–17.) Plaintiff also points to two statutes to further support their fear of prosecution for their activities: Mont. Code Ann §§ 13-35-105 (“Aiding and Abetting”) and 13-35-205(6) (“Tampering With Election Records and Information”). (*Id.* at 17.)

First, HB 892’s scienter element, “purposefully,” does indeed provide clarification—it sets a high standard of culpability and increases the State’s burden of proving a criminal violation. There should also be no confusion that “purposefully” applies to all of the conduct contemplated by HB 892’s multiple registration prohibition.<sup>5</sup> Second, while Plaintiff theoretically could be legally accountable for the conduct of another under the aiding and abetting statute,<sup>6</sup> Plaintiff still must have the “mental state described by the statute defining the offense” and “cause[] another to perform the conduct[.]” Mont. Code Ann § 45-2-302. This means that Plaintiff must *purposefully*—not negligently or otherwise—cause a registrant to remain multiple registered or omit prior registration information from the registration application. Finally, Plaintiff cannot be held liable merely for “caus[ing] a name to be placed on the registry lists” under Mont. Code Ann. § 13-35-205(6), as its conduct must also satisfy Mont. Code Ann. § 45-7-208,<sup>7</sup> which ascribes the

*mens rea* of either “purposefully” or “knowingly” to the conduct contemplated therein. *Id.* It is therefore clear that Plaintiff does not risk criminal liability under these circumstances by taking actions that are simply accidental, inadvertent, or negligent.

In sum, Plaintiff’s efforts to characterize HB 892 as a dramatic change to Montana’s election rules fall flat. Montana has required prior voter registration information for decades, and Plaintiff’s fanciful hypotheticals fail to account for basic concepts of criminal law. Plaintiff ultimately fails to demonstrate any actual or imminent injury stemming from HB 892, and its imagined chilling effect is woefully insufficient to establish standing. Plaintiff’s Motion fails for this reason.

**B. HB 892 DOES NOT VIOLATE THE RIGHT TO FREEDOM OF SPEECH.**

Article II, Section 7 of the Montana Constitution states that “[n]o law shall be passed impairing the freedom of speech or expression.” *Id.* Montana is bound to the guarantees of the First Amendment by the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment. *State v. Dugan*, 2013 MT 38, ¶ 17, 369 Mont. 39, 303 P.3d 755 (internal citations omitted). However, “it has never been deemed an abridgement of freedom of speech or press to make a course of conduct illegal merely because the conduct was in part initiated, evidenced, or carried out by means of language, either spoken, written, or printed.” *United States v. Hansen*, 599 U.S. 762 (2023) (quotation omitted); *cf. State v. Lance*, 222 Mont. 92, 102, 721 P.2d 1258 (1986) (noting that the challenged statute (punishing threats by one to physically restrain another) “carries a heavy burden since it seeks to prohibit pure speech without any requirement of an overt act.”).

Here, HB 892’s challenged provision simply prohibits voter registration in multiple jurisdictions. A violation of this prohibition requires either the overt act of purposefully remaining registered in multiple jurisdictions or the overt act of purposefully omitting prior registration information from the voter registration form. This hardly amounts to a requirement that Plaintiff “speak cautiously” in its advocacy or voter registration outreach programs as it claims. (Doc. 15 at 11.) Indeed, Plaintiff’s activities prior to HB 892 presumably included educating voters on how to register to vote in a compliant manner, and it remains unclear how this has changed. Plaintiff makes no allegation that its outreach entails counseling voters to remain multiple registered or encouraging registrants to omit prior registration information when completing a voter registration form. (*See* Doc. 15 at 9–11.) Plaintiff is clearly aware of HB 892’s multiple registration



prohibition, and can continue its work without issue by simply informing voters and registrants of that fact.

Plaintiff's attempt to establish otherwise with misplaced reliance on Montana case law is unavailing. For example, Plaintiff cites *Mont. Auto Assn. v. Greely*, for the proposition that organizations must be able to "protect their 'opportunity to persuade to action.'" 193 Mont. 378, 632 P.2d 300 (1981) (Doc. 15 at 9.) But that case involved a challenge to the Lobbying Act, Initiative No. 85, which prohibited "unprofessional conduct" in lobbying, and held the Initiative to be unconstitutional in part because "the prohibited conduct is nothing more than a standard and accepted means of involvement in the political process." *Id.* at 387, 632 P.2d at 305. In contrast, Plaintiff makes no coherent argument that maintaining multiple registrations is a standard and accepted means of participation in the political process.

Ultimately, HB 892 actually furthers Plaintiff's stated goals of protecting voters' franchise and encouraging eligible voter registration. (*See* Doc. 15 at 9.) HB 892 bolsters existing voter residency requirements, prevents the dilution of votes through double voting, and enhances public trust in fair elections. There are all compelling state interests, and HB 892 comes nowhere near violating Plaintiff's right to freedom of speech. Plaintiff accordingly fails to demonstrate a likelihood of success on the merits of its freedom of speech claim.

### **C. HB 892 DOES NOT VIOLATE THE RIGHT TO FREEDOM OF ASSOCIATION.**

Plaintiff again relies on *Mont. Auto Assn. v. Greely* in support of its argument that HB 892 violates its right to freedom of association. (Doc. 15 at 12.) But Plaintiff does not explain how HB 892 prevents it from engaging in advocacy with voters. Unlike the *Greely* case, in which the challenged statute prohibited "unprofessional conduct" which the court found to be a "standard and accepted means of involvement in the political process," HB 892 prohibits double voting, which is widely denounced and prohibited.<sup>8</sup> Plaintiff goes on to argue that "the right to free association guarantees "the unfettered interchange of ideas for the bringing about of political and social changes desired by the people."" (Doc. 15 at 12.) But Plaintiff fails to explain how HB 892's ban on double voting prevents the interchange of these ideas. And, again, Plaintiff never alleges

that part of its advocacy and association with members, organizers, volunteers, and voters includes advocating for voters to remain registered in multiple jurisdictions or vote twice in the same election. (*See generally* Doc. 15.) And once again, in more speculation, Plaintiff alleges that “HB 892’s hurdles will impede the registration process” and that “[c]ivic organizations are reasonably concerned that HB 892 will scare off current and potential voters...” (Doc. 15 at 13.) But it appears that theoretical concern is all that Plaintiff has to support this argument, because the facts show that voter registration continues to increase since the passage of HB 892. (Ex. H at ¶ 15.) Prohibiting double voting furthers the compelling state interests of preserving election integrity as well as public trust in elections. HB 892 does not violate the right to freedom of association. Plaintiff is not likely to succeed on the merits.

**D. HB 892 DOES NOT VIOLATE THE RIGHT TO FREEDOM OF SUFFRAGE.**

Article II, § 13 of the Montana Constitution provides: “All elections shall be free and open, and no power, civil or military, shall at any time interfere to prevent the free exercise of the right of suffrage.” *Willems v. State*, 2014 MT 82, ¶ 32, 374 Mont. 343, 325 P.3d 1204 (quoting Mont. Const. art. II, § 13). “[T]he right to suffrage can be denied by a debasement or dilution of the weight of a citizen’s vote just as effectively as by wholly prohibiting the free exercise of the franchise.” *Burns v. Cty. of Musselshell*, 2019 MT 291, ¶ 19, 398 Mont. 140, 454 P.3d 685 (citing *Big Spring v. Jore*, 2005 MT 64, ¶ 18, 325 Mont. 256, 109 P.3d 219.) The right to vote is protected in more than the initial allocation of the franchise. *Big Spring*, ¶ 18 (quoting *Bush v. Gore*, 531 U.S. 98, 104–05 (2000)). Equal protection applies as well to the manner of its exercise. *Id.* Having once granted the right to vote on equal terms, the State may not, by later arbitrary and disparate treatment, value one person’s vote over that of another. *Id.*

Plaintiff cites one case for the proposition that the right to suffrage is a fundamental right but offers no authority for its argument that preventing double voting by prohibiting multiple registration violates that right. (Doc. 15 at 14–15.) Plaintiff complains that HB 892 places “additional hoops” on voters which discourage registration. Their only support for this claim is speculation. (*See generally* Doc. 15, Exhibits 1–5.) The facts bely their claims—since HB 892 went into effect, at least 17,982 voter registrations have been received by the Secretary of State. (Ex. H at ¶ 15.) Voters are actively registering, undeterred by HB 892. HB 892 plainly does not violate the right to suffrage. Nothing about HB 892 prevents a voter from voting. Nothing takes away that franchise. Nor does HB 892 debase or dilute the vote. Rather, HB 892 actually preserves

the right to suffrage by prohibiting and preventing double voting, thereby ensuring that each voter's vote is not debased or diluted by illegal double votes. Prohibiting and preventing double voting—which undermines the right to suffrage—in order to protect the integrity of elections, is a compelling state interest. Plaintiff is not likely to succeed on the merits.

**E. HB 892 IS NOT UNCONSTITUTIONALLY VAGUE.**

Statutes are accorded a presumption of constitutionality; the burden of proof is upon the party challenging a statute's constitutionality. *Monroe v. State*, 265 Mont. 1, 3, 873 P.2d 230, 231 (1994) (citation omitted). Any doubt is to be resolved in favor of the statute. *Id.* A statute is unconstitutionally vague and void on its face if “it fails to give a person of ordinary intelligence fair notice that his contemplated conduct is forbidden.” *State v. Brogan*, 272 Mont. 156, 168, 900 P.2d 284, 291 (1995) (quotation omitted). “When faced with a vague-as-applied challenge to a statute, we determine whether the challenged statute provides a person with actual notice and whether the statute provides minimal guidelines to law enforcement.” *State v. Watters*, 2009 MT 163, ¶ 32, 350 Mont. 465, 208 P.3d 408; *State v. Dixon*, 2000 MT 82, ¶¶ 27–31, 299 Mont. 165, 998 P.2d 544.

**1. HB 892 provides fair and actual notice of its requirements.**

“In determining whether a statute provides actual notice to citizens, we must determine whether the statute gives a person of ordinary intelligence fair notice that their contemplated conduct is forbidden.” *Dixon*, ¶ 27. HB 892 articulates a clear legislative objective. It amends Mont. Code Ann. § 13-35-210 to codify Montana's established practice of requiring a registrant to disclose, if applicable, their previous registration information on the registration form. (Ex. A at § 1(5).) HB 892's plain language simply codifies this longstanding requirement (*see* Ex. B–F), explicitly bans the acts of double voting and purposefully remaining registered to vote in more than one jurisdiction, and prescribes a criminal punishment should someone be convicted of violating its provisions. (Ex. A at §§ 1(5)–(6).) The Legislature specifically ascribed the *mens rea* requirement of “purposefully” to that action.<sup>9</sup>

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<sup>9</sup> This *mens rea* applies to both sentences in Section 5 of HB 892, despite “purposefully” being stated only in the first sentence. *See* Mont. Code Ann. § 45-2-103(4) (“If the statute defining an offense prescribes a particular mental state with respect to the offense as a whole without distinguishing among the elements of the offense, the prescribed mental state applies to each element.”).

Under Title 45’s General Principles of Liability, “a person acts purposely with respect to a result or to conduct described by a statute defining an offense if it is the person’s conscious object to engage in that conduct or to cause that result.” Mont. Code. Ann § 45-2-101(65). Thus, to violate HB 892’s multiple registration prohibition, it must be a person’s conscious object to remain registered to vote in more than one jurisdiction. The intentional use of a mental state narrows rather than broadens the category of individuals who may run afoul of the law. Moreover, § 1(6) specifically provides “on conviction”—meaning that an investigation by law enforcement and a prosecution must precede any punishment. (Ex. A at § 1(6).)<sup>10</sup> A registrant easily satisfies the law’s requirement by simply providing previous registration information on the Montana Voter Registration Application—the SOS takes care of the rest. (Ex. G, § 9; Ex. H at ¶¶ 5–6.)

If the registrant provides the information, there is no reasonable risk of violation. Moreover, the application clearly states that the information is required. (*Id.* at § 9.) This process is like that of other states within the Ninth Circuit. (*See e.g.*, Ex. M, § 14 (“I am registered to vote in another state, cancel my registration in:”); Ex. N, § 7 (“Are you registered to vote in another state? I hereby authorize cancellation of my previous registration at the following address, county, state, and zip code.”).) The “Applicant Affirmation” section further informs an applicant of their obligation to conform their conduct to the law. (Ex. G (“I affirm under penalty of perjury that the information on this application is true. . . I understand that if I have given false information on this application, I may be subject to a fine or imprisonment, or both, under federal and/or state law”).) Other Ninth Circuit states similarly require such affirmation. (*See* Ex. I–O.) In sum, HB 892 effectively provides a person of ordinary intelligence fair notice that both double voting and maintaining more than one voter registration is prohibited under Montana law.

## **2. HB 892 establishes minimal guidelines to govern law enforcement.**

To determine whether the statute provides minimal guidelines to law enforcement, “a court must establish whether the guidelines are sufficient “to prevent arbitrary and discriminatory enforcement[.]” *Dixon*, ¶ 31. Despite Plaintiff’s contentions,<sup>11</sup> no speculation is required—HB 892 prescribes the required conduct, to whom its prohibition applies to, and when the prohibitions

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<sup>10</sup> The State’s burden of proof is beyond a reasonable doubt. Mont. Code Ann. § 26-1-403(2). *See also* Mont. Code Ann. § 45-2-104 (precluding application of absolute liability to HB 892 given its stated penalties and the lack of legislative intent to impose absolute liability).

<sup>11</sup> “HB 892 unconstitutionally requires Montanans ‘to speculate as to whether [their] contemplated course of action may be subject to criminal penalties.’” (Doc. 15 at 17) (citation omitted).

began to apply. The required conduct is to provide prior registration information when registering to vote, as applicable, and refrain from registering to vote in Montana with the conscious object of remaining registered elsewhere.<sup>12</sup> (Ex. A at § 1(5).) The “who” and “when” questions are also straightforward—the multiple registration prohibition applies to those who have sought or will seek to register to vote in Montana from HB 892’s effective date going forward. (*Id.*) *See also* Mont. Code Ann. § 1-2-109 (“No law contained in any of the statutes of Montana is retroactive unless expressly so declared.”) A person who was registered to vote in multiple jurisdictions prior to HB 892’s effective date also violates the law by remaining multiple registered after the effective date, but only if remaining multiple registered is that person’s conscious object. (Ex. A at § 1(5).) *See also* Mont. Code Ann. § 45-2-101(65).

Ultimately, HB 892 is straightforward and common-sense legislation. It simply requires a registrant to complete the Voter Registration Application accurately and honestly to the best of his or her knowledge, and the SOS will cancel any identified prior registration for that person. A person of ordinary intelligence can easily understand what is required of them in this context. Plaintiff also provides no coherent argument for how HB 892 might encourage arbitrary or discriminatory enforcement in the face of clear evidence to the contrary. *See* (Ex. H at ¶¶ 15–17; Ex. B at ¶ 8; Ex. C at ¶ 12.) Plaintiff therefore fails to show how HB 892 does not meet either the as applied or facial vagueness tests. The Court should deny Plaintiff’s Motion accordingly.

## **II. PLAINTIFF WILL NOT SUFFER IRREPARABLE HARM IN THE ABSENCE OF A PRELIMINARY INJUNCTION.**

Plaintiffs must show more than a possibility of future harm; they are required “to demonstrate that irreparable injury is *likely* in the absence of an injunction.” *Winter*, 555 U.S. at 22 (emphasis in the original) (citations omitted); *see also* 11A Charles Alan Wright, Arthur R. Miller, & Mary Kay Kane, *Federal Practice and Procedure* § 2948.1, 139 (2d ed. 1995) (“*Wright & Miller*”) (applicant must demonstrate that in the absence of a preliminary injunction, “the applicant is likely to suffer irreparable harm before a decision on the merits can be rendered”); *Wright & Miller* at 154–155 (“A preliminary injunction will not be issued simply to prevent the possibility of some remote future injury”). “Any time a State is enjoined by a court from

---

<sup>12</sup> “When a particular purpose is an element of an offense, the element is established although the purpose is conditional, unless the condition negatives the harm or evil sought to be prevented by the law defining the offense. Equivalent terms, such as ‘purpose’ and ‘with the purpose,’ have the same meaning.” § 45-2-101(65)

effectuating statutes enacted by representatives of its people, it suffers a form of irreparable injury.” *Maryland v. King*, 567 U.S. 1301, 1301 (2012) (Roberts, C.J., in chambers).

**A. PLAINTIFF’S DELAY IN SEEKING RELIEF UNDERCUTS ANY CLAIM THAT IT WILL SUFFER IRREPARABLE INJURY.**

Courts look with disfavor on plaintiffs that engage in unexplained delay prior to seeking a preliminary injunction. The Montana Supreme Court recently stayed a preliminary injunction because, as the SOS argued, “Plaintiffs chose not to file for injunctive relief until months after the new enactments were implemented and successfully employed in the elections conducted during 2021.” *Mont. Democratic Party v. Jacobsen*, 2022 Mont. LEXIS 459, \*7 (May 17, 2022). The Ninth Circuit has also made clear that a “long delay before seeking a preliminary injunction implies a lack of urgency and irreparable harm.” *Oakland Tribune, Inc. v. Chronicle Pub. Co., Inc.*, 762 F.2d 1374 1377 (9th Cir. 1985); *see also Lydo Enters. v. City of Las Vegas*, 745 F.2d 1211, 1213–14 (9th Cir. 1984) (“A delay in seeking a preliminary injunction is a factor to be considered in weighing the propriety of relief.”); *Playboy Enters., Inc. v. Netscape Communications Corp.*, 55 F.Supp.2d 1070, 1090 (C.D.Cal. 1999) (five month delay in seeking injunctive relief demonstrated lack of irreparable harm), *aff’d*, 202 F.3d 278 (9th Cir. 1999); *Valeo Intellectual Prop., Inc. v. Data Dept. Corp.*, 368 F.Supp.2d 1121, 1128 (three month delay in seeking injunctive relief was inconsistent with irreparable harm).

In this case, Plaintiff’s substantial (and unexplained) delay before seeking preliminary injunctive relief significantly undermines its assertion of imminent irreparable injury. HB 892 became “effective upon passage and approval” on May 22, 2023 (Ex. A at § 4), yet Plaintiff waited a total of 179 days to seek a preliminary injunction. (Doc. 15.) If three months of delay is inconsistent with a claim of irreparable harm (*Valeo*, 368 F.Supp.2d at 1128), then a nearly six-month delay certainly is as well. Plaintiff has thus failed to satisfy its burden to show irreparable harm in the absence of injunctive relief, and its Motion must be denied.

**B. HB 892 REPRESENTS THE STATUS QUO.**

“The purpose of a preliminary injunction is merely to preserve the relative positions of the parties until a trial on the merits can be held.” *Univ. of Tex. v. Camenisch*, 451 U.S. 390, 395 (1981). This purpose, however, is not to be confused with the movant’s burden to establish each of the elements to obtain relief. *Winter*, 555 U.S. at 20. Yet Plaintiff argues that “[a]bsent an injunction to maintain the status quo, Plaintiff will be irreparably harmed.” (Doc. 15 at 19.) Not

only is this the wrong standard for a preliminary injunction, but Plaintiff misses—or ignores—that in the intervening months since HB 892 went into effect, the statute, itself, became the status quo. *See Weems v. State*, 2019 MT 98, ¶ 26, 395 Mont. 350, 440 P.3d 4 (status quo means “the last actual, peaceable, noncontested condition which preceded the pending controversy”) (internal quotations and citations omitted).

In *Mont. Democratic Party v. Jacobsen*, the plaintiffs failed to seek injunctive relief until months after the new laws had been implemented and successfully employed in prior elections. 2022 Mont. LEXIS 459 at \*7. During that time, approximately 337,000 Montanans voted, and the SOS had spent “nearly a year of voter education, election administrator, and poll volunteer training, and drafting and application of administrative rules.” *Id.* at \*\*8–11. Based on these facts, the Court held that “the status quo [was] best maintained by staying the preliminary injunction.” *Id.* at \*12. Similarly, here, during the nearly six months Plaintiff waited to seek a preliminary injunction, 17,982 people registered to vote, and at least 54 elections occurred in Montana. (Ex. H at ¶¶ 15–16.) Plaintiff not only fails to explain its delay, but also completely ignores the reality that Montana went through an entire election cycle under HB 892 without any evidence of resulting problems or confusion. HB 892’s codification of longstanding practice—going back to at least 1968—perhaps explains the lack of such issues. (Ex. B at ¶¶ 6–10; Ex. C at ¶ 12; Exs. D–F.) In *Mont. Democratic Party*, there had been nearly a year of education and training both voters and election administrators; in this case requesting prior voter registration information has been the standard on forms and a normal process for SOS for at least 55 years. Halting the continued implementation of this requirement will have a severe impact on the State. “If the requirement to supply previous registration information is enjoined, it would affect the administration of elections to ensure accuracy of voter rolls and efficient administration of elections.” (Ex. C at ¶ 8.)

Contrary to the underlying purpose of a preliminary injunction, enjoining HB 892 would actually *alter* the status quo by requiring county election administrators to cease enduring historical practices. Along with impacting the administration of elections and accuracy of voter rolls, it would impede the ability of election officials to prevent double voting by inhibiting the State’s ability to determine who is registered in multiple jurisdictions. (Ex. H at ¶¶ 5–14.) This means that, if the Court were to enjoin HB 892, it is the State of Montana who will actually suffer irreparable harm by being prevented from implementing legislation directed at preventing fraud and maintaining public confidence in fair elections. *See Latta v. Otter*, 771 F.3d 496, 500 (9th Cir.

2014) (noting authority for the proposition “that ‘a state suffers irreparable injury whenever an enactment of its people or their representatives is enjoined’” (quotation omitted)). Thus, the status quo is best maintained by *not* enjoining HB 892. Plaintiff cannot demonstrate any likelihood that it will suffer irreparable harm in the absence of a preliminary injunction under these circumstances. Plaintiff’s Motion fails for this reason as well.

### **III. THE BALANCE OF THE EQUITIES AND THE PUBLIC INTEREST FAVOR THE STATE.**

The balance of the equities and the public interest factors merge when the government is a party. *Nken v. Holder*, 556 U.S. 418, 435 (2009). A preliminary injunction movant must show that “the balance of equities tips in his favor.” *Shell Offshore, Inc. v. Greenpeace, Inc.*, 709 F.3d 1281, 1291 (9th Cir. 2013) (citing *Winter*, 555 U.S. at 20). In assessing whether the plaintiffs have met this burden, courts have a “duty . . . to balance the interests of all parties and weigh the damage to each.” See *L.A. Memorial Coliseum Commn. v. Natl. Football League*, 634 F.2d 1197, 1203 (9th Cir. 1980). “If, however, the impact of an injunction reaches beyond the parties, carrying with it a potential for public consequences, the public interest will be relevant to whether the district court grants the preliminary injunction.” *Stormans, Inc. v. Selecky*, 586 F.3d 1109, 1139 (9th Cir. 2009). When an injunction is sought that will adversely affect a public interest, a court may in the public interest withhold relief until a final determination on the merits, even if the postponement is burdensome to the plaintiff. *Id.* (citing *Weinberger v. Romero-Barcelo*, 456 U.S. 305, 312–13 (1982)). In fact, courts “should pay particular regard for the public consequences in employing the extraordinary remedy of injunction.” *Id.* (quoting *Weinberger*, 456 U.S. at 312).

Plaintiff filed its Motion to block the enforcement of HB 892, but the very fact that HB 892 is a duly enacted statute weighs against granting an injunction here. *Golden Gate Rest. Assn. v. City of S.F.*, 512 F.3d 1112, 1126 (9th Cir. 2008) (“The public interest may be declared in the form of a statute.”); *New Motor Vehicle Bd. of Cal. v. Orrin W. Fox Co.*, 434 U.S. 1345, 1351 (1977) (a State “suffers a form of irreparable injury” any time it is prevented from “effectuating” laws “enacted by representatives of its people”). There can be no reasonable dispute that Montana has compelling interests in ensuring the integrity of elections and maintaining public confidence in them. *Brnovich v. Democratic Natl. Comm.*, 141 S. Ct. 2321, 2340 (2021). To that end, HB 892 reflects the Legislature’s intent to bolster its ban on double voting by prohibiting multiple registrations as a reasonable and effective preventive measure. These interests dramatically



overshadow Plaintiff's purported fears based on conjured hypotheticals. The balance of the equities and the public interest therefore weigh heavily against a preliminary injunction here, and Plaintiff's Motion therefore fails.

### CONCLUSION

HB 892 merely codifies decades of longstanding practice of requiring voter registration applicants to provide previous voter registration information. The extraordinary remedy of injunctive relief is not appropriate here. Plaintiff cannot show a likelihood of success on the merits because it has shown no concrete injury and therefore lacks standing. Additionally, HB 892 doesn't violate Plaintiff's rights to free speech, association, or suffrage, and is not unconstitutionally vague. Plaintiff cannot show irreparable harm in the absence of a preliminary injunction because it waited nearly six months to seek injunctive relief, and the Secretary of State has processed 17,982 voter registrations and 54 elections have been conducted since HB 892's enactment. Finally, the balance of the equities and the public interest favor the State, which has a compelling interest in ensuring the integrity of elections and maintaining public confidence in them. HB 892 is a proper exercise of legislative authority aimed at preventing fraud and preserving public confidence in fair elections. Plaintiff cannot satisfy even one element of the test for a preliminary injunction to issue, much less all of them. For these reasons, Plaintiff's Motion for Preliminary Injunction should be denied.

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AN ACT REVISING VOTING LIMITS; PROHIBITING DOUBLE VOTING; PROVIDING A PENALTY;  
PROVIDING A DEFINITION; PROVIDING AN APPROPRIATION; AMENDING SECTION 13-35-210, MCA;  
AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

**Section 1.** Section 13-35-210, MCA, is amended to read:

**"13-35-210. Limits on voting rights.** (1) ~~No person may vote who is not entitled to vote. A person who is not an elector may not vote.~~

(2) ~~No person.~~ An elector may not vote more than once at an election.

(2)(3) ~~No A person may not,~~ for any election, apply for a ballot in the name of some other person, whether it be the name of a living, dead, or fictitious person.

(4) ~~A person or elector may not vote in this state more than once at any election held in this state or vote in both this state and another state or territory in the same or equivalent elections, except in a special district election in which a person or elector is entitled to vote.~~

(5) ~~A person or elector may not purposefully remain registered to vote in more than one place in this state or another state any time, unless related to involvement in special district elections. A person or elector previously registered to vote in another county or another state shall provide the previous registration information on the Montana voter registration application provided for in 13-2-110.~~

(6) ~~A person who violates this section shall, on conviction, be fined up to \$5,000, be imprisoned for up to 18 months, or both.~~

(7) (a) As used in this section, "equivalent elections" means:

(i) elections that have the same date for in-person voting; or

(ii) primary elections that determine which candidates appear on the ballots of general elections if

those general elections have the same date for in-person voting.

(b) The term does not include a special district election held simultaneously with another election."

**Section 2. Appropriation.** There is appropriated \$1,000 from the general fund to the secretary of state for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, for the purpose of implementing [this act].

**Section 3. Severability.** If a part of [this act] is invalid, all valid parts that are severable from the invalid part remain in effect. If a part of [this act] is invalid in one or more of its applications, the part remains in effect in all valid applications that are severable from the invalid applications.

**Section 4. Effective date.** [This act] is effective on passage and approval.

1. I am the Elections Division Supervisor for Lewis and Clark County.
2. As Elections Division Supervisor, I am “responsible for the administration of all procedures relating to registration of electors and conduct of elections, [ ] keep all county records relating to elector registration and elections, and [am] the primary point of contact for the county with respect to the statewide voter registration list and implementation of other provisions of applicable federal law governing elections.” §13-1-3-01, MCA.
3. I am aware that the 2023 Montana Legislature passed House Bill 892 (“HB 892”).
4. I am familiar with the contents and substance of HB 892.
5. Since I first registered to vote in 2013, I know previous voter registration information, if applicable, has been required by the Montana Voter Registration Application.
6. The requirement by applicants who are registered in another jurisdiction to supply previous registration is crucial for Election Administrators to properly perform our duties.
7. I am aware that HB 892 codified Montana’s longstanding requirement to supply previous registration information.
8. If the requirement to supply previous registration information is enjoined, it would affect the administration of elections to ensure accuracy of voter rolls and efficient administration of elections.
9. By requiring those who are registered elsewhere to supply previous registration information, election administrators can assist voters and facilitate efforts to keep our voter rolls clean.
10. The requirement to provide previous registration information assists election administrators in their efforts to maintain voter rolls.

11. This maintenance of voter rolls is not confined solely to the State of Montana, but also assists in the maintenance of voter rolls in other states.

12. I am unaware of any voter that refused to register to vote based on the requirement to provide previous voter registration information, prior to or after, codification on the longstanding practice.

13. The requirement to provide previous voter registration information is plainly stated on the application.

14. Voter registration applications that do not contain previous voter registration information are processed by the Lewis and Clark County Elections Office in the same way as prior to the passage into law of HB 892.

15. I am aware that HB 892 also effectively clarifies penalties for violating §13-35-210, MCA.

16. Pursuant to Section 1-6-105, MCA, I hereby declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct.

I, DANA CORSON, submit the following Declaration:

1. I have been employed in the Montana Secretary of State's Office continuously since 2007 and intend to retire in 2024.
2. From August 2017 to April 2023, I served as Montana's Elections Director.
3. I am aware that prior to HB 892 being signed into law, applicants registering to vote in Montana were required to provide previous registration information if previously registered to vote in another Montana county or another state by the Montana Voter Registration Form, under penalty of perjury.
4. I am aware that people registering to vote were required to provide previous registration information on the voter registration form in Montana for decades.
5. Previous registration information is used to generate a notice that is supplied to the former jurisdiction. Doing so is a vital component of maintaining accurate voter records.
6. Previous voter registration information is also used as an identification tool to update county to county record transfers whenever the applicant registers using alternative identification method. Previous voter information is an assistive piece of information for county-to-county maintenance.
7. In my position with the Secretary of State's Office, I am also aware of past instances in Montana where voters appeared to have voted in the same election twice.

8. For instance, Exhibit P attached to Defendants' Response is a true and correct copy of a record received by the Secretary of State depicting voters who received ballots and at least one occasion voted ballots using the same mailing address from two different states for the same election during the 2020 Federal Election.

9. In my position with the Secretary of State's Office, I reviewed the data and cross verified it with the corresponding state to confirm that both jurisdictions were indeed identifying the same singular voter and that a ballot was cast in both elections.

10. The list of individuals that maintained a voter registration in Montana and another jurisdiction and voted with a voter record indicating voter credit for the same election was then forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

11. The case is ongoing with the FBI. The FBI is conducting a criminal investigation concerning the subject matter in Exhibit P.

12. Once a ballot is separated from the secrecy envelope, there is no way to retrieve the ballot, and Montana voters are unable to rectify an illegally cast ballot's effect on the election.

13. It is not uncommon to see a race in an election decided by one vote, or even result in a tie. For example, in November 2023 an election in Missoula County resulted in a tie vote. In 2017, Lewis and Clark County had a tied election.

14. Guarding against double voting is important to preserve the integrity of Montana's elections.

15. Montana's Voter Registration system shows 17,982 registrations, as of December 5, 2023, with a registration date from the date HB 892 was signed in law to present. The number of registrations has increased from the previous week by well over 650 registrations. The number of registrations continues to increase each week.

16. Although not every local, school, or special district election utilizes ElectMT, however to the best of my knowledge, at least 54 elections have been conducted utilizing ElectMT since the implementation of HB 892.

17. To the best of my knowledge, the Secretary of State has not received a single complaint from a voter related to HB 892 or the implementation of the same.

18. I hereby declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct.

### Section 1 - Qualifications

You must check the box to indicate that you are a United States citizen and a resident of California.

You must also indicate that you are:

- 16 or 17 and want to pre-register.

### Section 2 - Your Legal Name

You are required to provide your:

- 1) First name,
- 2) Middle name if applicable, and
- 3) Last name (including any suffix, such as Jr., Sr., III).

### Section 3 - Identification

You will need to provide your:

- 1) Date of birth,
- 2) CA driver license or CA ID card number,
- 3) Last 4 numbers of your SSN, if you have one, and
- 4) U.S. state or foreign country of birth.

### Section 4 - Address Where You Live

You CANNOT use a P.O. Box # for this section. You must provide your:

- 1) Home address, including apartment or unit number if applicable,
- 2) City,
- 3) Zip code, and
- 4) California county.

If you do not have a street address, you can give an exact description of where you live. Include cross streets, routes, etc.

### Section 5 - Mailing Address

If you have a different mailing address provide it here. You may use a P.O. Box # as your mailing address.

### Section 6 - Registration History

Complete the registration history section. If you were previously registered. You will provide your:

- 1) Full legal name,
- 2) Previous address, and
- 3) Previous political party preference (if any).

### Section 7 - Vote By Mail

County elections officials will mail vote-by-mail ballots to all active registered voters.

### Section 8 - Political Party Preference

You can choose from the following political parties:

- American Independent Party
- Democratic Party
- Green Party
- Libertarian Party
- Peace and Freedom Party
- Republican Party
- Other, which you will need to write in

If you do not want to choose a political party, you may check the "No Party/None" box.

- If you chose this option, you may not be able to vote for some presidential candidates at a presidential primary election or for a party's central committee.



## Section 9 - Optional Voter Information

You may include your email and phone number.

You may select your language preference for receiving election materials in the following languages:

- 3) Are not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court.
- 4) Understand that it is a crime to intentionally provide incorrect information on the card.
- 5) Declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the information on the card is true and correct.

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## Bottom of the Card - Blue Box

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If someone has helped you fill out or deliver your Voter Registration Card, the blue box found on the bottom right-hand side must be completed and signed by the person who assisted you.

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## When Finished

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- Tear off the bottom part of the Voter Registration Card as your receipt and keep it until you receive a notice from your county elections official.
- Fold and use tape to seal your Voter Registration Card. Do not staple the card.

No postage is necessary if mailed in the United States.

- You have been convicted of a **felony** and have not had your civil rights restored. Civil rights are automatically restored if you have only **one** felony conviction, completed your sentence, parole, or probation, and paid any victim restitution.

You **can** register to vote if you have only **misdeemeanor** convictions or you are in **pretrial detention** and are otherwise eligible.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

- Register **online** at [www.servicearizona.com](http://www.servicearizona.com), or **mail** or **take** your completed, signed form to your County Recorder (acceptable mailing addresses provided below) or person designated to receive registration forms. Keep this copy as your receipt. The County Recorder will send you a confirmation of registration within 4-6 weeks.
- Fill in your political party preference in Box 14. If you leave this box blank as a first-time registrant, your party will be none or "No Party Designated." If you are already registered and you leave this box blank, you will keep your prior party preference. If you pick "Other," write the full name of your preferred party on the line provided.

## REGISTRATION DEADLINE

- You must register at least **29 days before the election** (or the next business day if that deadline falls on a holiday) to vote in that election.
- If returned by mail, the registration must be: (1) postmarked by the deadline and received by the County Recorder by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day; or (2) dated on or before the deadline and received by the County Recorder no later than 5 days after the deadline.

## PROOF OF CITIZENSHIP REQUIREMENT

To be eligible to vote a "full ballot," you must submit proof of citizenship with your registration form or by 5:00 p.m. on the Thursday before Election Day. A "full ballot" includes all federal, state, county, and local races and ballot questions for which you are eligible to vote.

If you do not submit proof of citizenship and we cannot acquire your proof of citizenship from the Arizona Motor Vehicle Division or the statewide voter registration database, you will receive a "federal-only" ballot, which has only federal races and no state, county, or local races or initiatives/referendums.

You don't need to resubmit proof of citizenship if you previously registered to vote in Arizona and submitted citizenship proof, and are using this form to update your name, party affiliation, or address after moving within the state.

## VALID FORMS OF PROOF OF CITIZENSHIP

If you have an **Arizona driver's license** or **non-operating license** issued after October 1, 1996, write the number in Box 9. This will serve as proof of citizenship and no additional documents are needed. However, if your license was issued when you were **not** a U.S. citizen but you later became a U.S. citizen, complete Box 11 or provide another form of proof of citizenship.

Your application will be denied if you do not provide an Alaska residence address or you provide a PO Box, HC No. and Box, PSC Box, Rural Route No., Commercial Address or Mail Stop Address or a residence address outside of Alaska on Line 4 of the application.

If your residence has been assigned a street name and house number, provide this information or indicate exactly where you live such as, highway name and milepost number, boat harbor, pier and slip number, subdivision name with lot and block or trailer park name and space number. If you live in rural Alaska, you may provide the community name as your residence address.

If you have a different mailing address than your residence address, you may choose to keep your residence address confidential. Confidential addresses are not released to the general public, but may be released to government agencies or during election processes as set out in state law.


